

# Immigrants in Massachusetts <u>A Profile of Immigrants from Travel Ban-Affected Countries</u>

#### **2016 NUMBERS AT A GLANCE**

- 835,600: Approximate number of immigrants\* from travel ban-affected countries living in the U.S. (<1% of the population)
- 15,500: Approximate number of immigrants from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts (<1% of the state's population)
- 9th: Rank of the state of Massachusetts among the 50 states and Washington, D.C. in terms of immigrants from travel ban-affected countries as a percentage of the state's population

#### Distribution of Immigrants from Travel Ban-Affected Countries in the State of Massachusetts

Figure 1 shows where immigrants from travel ban-affected countries live in the state of Massachusetts. Middlesex County (5,596), Suffolk County (3,774), and Norfolk County (1,750), reported the highest count of immigrants from travel ban-affected countries. The counties Nantucket County, Berkshire County, and Dukes County, MA report the lowest number of travel ban-affected immigrants.

#### Country of Birth<sup>†</sup>

Most of the travel-ban affected immigrants living in Massachusetts are from Iran, Venezuela, or Somalia (Figure 2).



#### Citizenship

Figure 3 shows that slightly under two-thirds of immigrants from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts are naturalized citizens.

\*Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.



## Immigrants in Massachusetts A Profile of Immigrants from Travel Ban-Affected Countries

#### Age

Figure 5 shows that immigrants from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts tend to be older, with over two-thirds of the population reporting to be 35 years and older. The median age of immigrants from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts is 43.

#### **English Proficiency**

Two-thirds of foreign-born individuals from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts are proficient in English (speaks only English or speaks English very well) (Figure 6).



#### **Educational Attainment**

Figure 7 shows that over half (57 percent) of the immigrants from travel ban-affected countries living in Massachusetts report having a bachelor's, graduate, professional, or doctoral degree. Among the native born U.S. population, 30 percent have a bachelor's, graduate, professional, or doctoral degree.
