

Distribution of Immigrants in the Providence-Warwick Metro Area, RI-MA

Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the Providence-Warwick metro area. Providence County reported the highest percentage of immigrants in this area. Eighteen percent of residents in Province County are immigrants. Washington County reported the lowest percentage of immigrants in the Providence-Warwick metro area (4%).

Year of Immigration




Figure 2. Year of Immigration Among Immigrants, 1920-2014

Figure 2 shows that more than one third of immigrants living in the Providence-Warwick Metro Area migrated to U.S. since 2000.

¹Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.

Foreign-Born Individuals, Age 25+




Figure 3 shows that one out of five immigrants living in the Providence-Warwick metro area has a bachelor's degree or higher.

Country of Birth

Figure 4 shows that 17 percent of foreign-born individuals living in the Providence-Warwick metro area come from Portugal and 14 percent come from the Dominican Republic or Guatemala. Note that the median age of immigrants from Portugal is 58, but immigrants from Dominican Republic are much younger, with median age of 42.



Figure 5 shows that 92 percent of immigrants living in the Providence-Warwick metro area are employed.

Figure 6 shows that three percent of immigrants living in the Providence-Warwick metro area are self-employed in their own incorporated business, and another four percent of immigrants are in unincorporated self-employment.
