## **Immigrants in Boone County, Missouri**

#### Figure 1. Immigrants in the state of Missouri





Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the state of Missouri. McDonald County (9%), Sullivan County (8%), St. Louis County (7%), St. Louis City (6%) and Boone County (6%) reported the highest percentages of immigrants as a percentage of the county's population in the state of Missouri.


<sup>1</sup>Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.



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### Figure 3. Family Size Among Immigrants



Boone County, MO Missouri, Excluding Boone County

Figure 3 shows that about one-third of immigrants in Boone County live in a household with one other family member, and 44 percent live in a household with three or more of their own family members.

Figure 5 shows that immigrants in Boone County are slightly more likely to have 0 or 1 children compared to all other immigrants in the state of Missouri.


#### Figure 4. Top Five Birthplaces Among Immigrants

Figure 4 shows that China is the top birthplace of immigrants in Boone County, while Mexico is the top birthplace of all other immigrants in Missouri. Boone County has higher shares of immigrants from China, India, Korea, and Canada than the rest of Missouri.

Figure 6 shows that a slightly larger share of immigrants living in Boone County earned \$75,000 or more compared to all other immigrants in the state of Missouri. Meanwhile, a slightly larger share of immigrants in Boone County earned less than \$40,000 compared to all other immigrants in Missouri. Immigrants in Boone County have a slightly lower median income (\$43,276) than all other immigrants in the state of Missouri (\$45,569).
