Overview

Public economics is the economic analysis of the public sector. It analyzes the effects of government policies on economic activities and the political processes (**public choice**) by which those policies are formed. **Public Finance** studies the fiscal aspects of public economics. These include government expenditures, taxation, and debt. Modern democratic governments directly control more than a third of gross national product and influence much of the rest through their fiscal and regulatory policies. This course provides students with the microeconomic tools to understand the impacts of those fiscal policies

Assignments and Requirements
