Overview

Syllabus

The course is concerned with the core concepts of law and economics, or the economic analysis of law. The major issues studied in this course are: the property law that defines property rights, the contract law that covers transfer of property, and tort law and criminal law that protect property. Economic markets are shaped by legal institutions such as property rights and freedom of contracts. Thus the focus of economic analysis of law is efficiency. (What is legal efficiency?) The main positive theory of legal efficiency states that the common law (judge-made law) is efficient. We will examine the limits of this theory. After the midterm, after covering the core concepts, students will participate in moot court by writing testimonies for the court hearing.
