## HIST 252 (001): History of East Asia, Part II

<u>Course Description</u>: This course is an introduction to some of the major themes in the history of East Asia from the late-eighteenth through the mid-twentieth centuries (1750s-1950s). Although conceived of as a regional history, the primary focus of this course will be on China and Japan. Issues covered will include imperialism, colonialism, nationalism, World War II, the Cold War, & revolutions.

**Requirements & Grading:** You must complete (that is, demonstrate serious engagement with) <u>every</u> requirement in order to receive a passing grade. The instructor reserves the final right to determine what constitutes "completion" of a requirement.

- 1. Participation (25%): I expect you to attend all scheduled meetings and to be fully prepared. This means finishing the assigned readings listed for that day <u>before</u> coming to class. The quality of your written and oral contributions both in class and online will be considered as indicators of your participation and engagement.
- 2. In-class Map Quiz (5%): A study guide will be provided on the first day of class. The quiz will be taken at the <u>start of class</u> on Wed. 2/3/2016. No make-ups will be allowed (unless prior arrangement has been made).
- 3. Midterm Exam (25%): identifications (<u>in-class</u>) & <u>take-home</u> essay; first draft due Wed. 3/2/2016; MIDTERM IDs will be taken in-class Mon. 3/14/2016; and final (revised) essay due in my departmental mailbox (in Robinson B359) by 12 p.m. (noon) Fri. 3/4/2016. No late work accepted for the midterm exam.
- 4. Online Exercises and Written Responses (20%): You will be responsible for completing two (2) online exercises, due by 5 p.m. on Tue. 3/29/2016 and Sun. 4/24/2016, as well as two (2) short (3 pg.) written responses, due in-class on Wed. 3/30/2016 and Mon. 4/25/2016. Detailed instructions are available on the course webpage and will be provided in hard copy in class. Policies and procedures for submitting written work are listed below (see Course Policies, points d and e).
- 5. Final Exam (25%): identifications (<u>in-classroom</u>) & <u>take-home</u> essay due at 9:45 a.m., Fri. 5/6/2016. <u>No</u> late work will be accepted for the final exam.

## Course Policies, Reminders, and Helpful Tips:

a) Class absences: Students are expected to attend all meetings of the course. In the event that you must miss class, you are responsible for the contents of the lecture or discussion. Students are expected to come to class on time. Late arrivals are disruptive, and late-comers may miss important information or hand-outs.

- b) Cell phones and other devices: During class all phones must be switched off and put away. Neither students nor instructors should compose, read, or respond to text messages during class. If you are an emergency responder (such as an EMT) and must receive calls or messages, please notify the instructor within the first week of class.
- c) Laptop computers: Students who wish to use a laptop computer for note-taking are welcome to do so. However, <u>students who use laptops for purposes other than taking notes (i.e., email, instant messaging, internet browsing unrelated to the course)</u> will be asked to leave and no longer be permitted to use a computer in class.
- d) Submission of written work: All written work is due at the <u>beginning</u> of class in hard copy on the day indicated on the syllabus. All written assignments should be typed, double-spaced, with 1-inch margins and in a 12-point font. Your name should be on the paper, and all pages should be stapled and numbered. *You must submit your work in hard copy only; no email attachments will accepted* (unless prior arrangements with the instructor have been made). You should, however, retain electronic copies of all written work, and your instructor may ask for an electronic copy of your paper in order to use it as an example in teaching or to submit to a plagiarism detection site like Turnitin.com.
- e) Late policy: All students are responsible for knowing and adhering to the deadlines for course assignments. Late work will be penalized ONE FULL LETTER GRADE (10 pts.) per day (including weekends & holidays). The only exceptions will be when you have explicit, advance permission from your instructor. If you anticipate a problem in completing or submitting your work on time, you must contact the instructor in a timely manner. If you do not hear back from your instructor, you should assume that your work is due on the original date. Regardless of whether or not you have been granted an extension, you must contact your instructor for how to submit late work. Late assignments will not be considered as "received" until a hard copy is in the instructor's hands. No late work will be accepted for the take-home midterm or final exams.
- f) Plagiarism: Don't do it. It's easy to spot & can result in expulsion from the University and loss of degree. What is plagiarism? As noted by the American Historical Association (AHA), "Writers plagiarize... when they fail to use quotation marks around borrowed material and to cite the source, use an inadequate paraphrase that makes only superficial changes to a text, or neglect to cite the source of a paraphrase."
