This class is designed as part lecture and part discussion with emphasis on the interaction between the Christian East, the Muslim World and the Christian West. We will examine primary sources (in translation) and secondary sources that render a wide spectrum of ideologies and scholarship on the crusading movement. Emphasis will be on themes of cultural interaction and transmission, warfare and coexistence between competing societies from Western Europe, Byzantium and the Middle East.

Assignments and Grades

- Participation in class discussion counts for 20% of the grade. Students are expected to arrive in class having prepared the assigned readings and ready for discussion.
- Bibliographic essay Each student must prepare a 4-5 page bibliographic essay on the topic of his/her final paper. This essay is due on November 8 [20% of your final grade]. It must identify the topic of the final essay and the scholarship that is relevant to the discussion in the form of an annotated bibliography.
- Oral Presentations Each student must present one oral presentation based on themes from class meetings during the semester. Class presentations must be done individually and should include visual and/or auditory materials. Each presentation should be approximately 10-15 minutes and should expand discussion on themes presented by the instructor during the initial portion of the class meeting that week. Each student will turn in the subsequent week a 5-7 page research essay highlighting the main points of the presentation. Topics will be discussed at the first class meeting.

 [The paper and presentation will each count for 15% of your grade a total of 30%]
- The Final paper will be a research essay due no later than December 13. The papers should be approximately 13-15 pages in length, double spaced, with footnotes/endnotes and bibliography. [30% of your total grade]. Class participation constitutes a significant part of your grade. If you cannot attend class you must notify the instructor in advance, if possible, and make every effort to keep up with the work of each week's reading assignments.
