Description

Late medieval Italy was filled with great romance, villainy, and heroic virtue, all captured in Dante's *Divine* Comedy. This course takes you inside the world of the famous Florentine poet with a special emphasis on the philosophical and theological ideas that shape the structure of the masterwork. Texts will be read in English translation.

Course Goals

To provide students with an introduction to a great literary classic To provide students with an introduction to literary criticism To illuminate the theological and philosophical context of the *Commedia*

Texts

The Portable Dante, trans. Mark Musa. (New York: Penguin Classics, 2004). **Required.** You must own this book and bring it to class each session.

Your responses may be written, in which case, they should be approximately 750 words each. Some students may choose other mediums. I have had students compose original music, paintings, films, or theatrical presentations, for example. All these short assignments are part of your class participation grade. The writing assignments will be graded on the following scale: zero or check. However, doing them carefully is crucial for exam preparation and for receiving a good class participation grade.

Mid-Term Exam: 40%. A written in-class examination. Date TBA.

<u>Final Exam.</u> 40%. A written, take-home examination. Must be completed by Dec. 14 at 4:00 pm. Must be submitted in hard copy to the Religious Studies Office, RB 465.
