Assignments:

- a). A close reading of the text according to assignments scheduled each class day.
- b). Four critical essays, c. 5-6 pages, on selected texts and issues in the *Phenomenology*. Each of these essays must be submitted if one is to receive a passing grade for the course.
 - The first essay does not require use of the secondary literature, although you may of course use this.
 - For each of the remaining essays one must use two articles or book chapters from the secondary literature.
 - Each essay will count for 25% of the final grade.
 - The first essay will analyze the dialectic of "Sense-Certainty" and the transition from "Sense-Certainty" to "Perception." (Tentative date: 27 September).
 - The second essay will analyze the dialectic of "Understanding" and the transition from "Understanding" to "Self-Consciousness" (Tentative date: 18 October).
 - The third essay will analyze the transition from "Self-Consciousness" to "Reason" (Tentative date: 8 November).
 - The fourth essay will deal with issues in the final readings from the *Phenomenology* examined curing the semester. (Due date: 13 December).

Description/Objectives:

A close, critical reading of selected chapters from Hegel's *Phenomenology of Spirit*. We will emphasize the chapters on Consciousness, Self-Consciousness, and Reason. At the end of the course we will at least briefly consider the conclusion that Hegel takes himself to reach on the *Phenomenology*. The course aims at a detailed analysis of selected texts in Hegel's *Phenomenology* and at an integrated and critical understanding of his conception of philosophy.
