This course provides an overview of Middle East history since 1800 and a context for understanding current political developments in this dynamic region. Following a brief discussion on the rise of Islam and the Arab conquests, we examine the decline of the Ottoman Empire; European colonialism; nationalist and Islamic responses to Western penetration; the establishment of modern nation-states and the formation of Israeli and Palestinian nationalism.

Most of the course will focus on events after World War II including the Arab-Israeli conflict; the Iranian Revolution; the first Gulf War; the 2003 Iraq War; the September 11th terrorist attacks and the Arab uprisings of 2011. Throughout the semester we will explore the relationship of religion and politics, especially the emergence of various strands of political Islam; US policy in the Middle East, and the status of women. Most classes will conclude with a brief review of current events and their connection to the readings. There will be some minor changes in the syllabus as we proceed through the semester.

Class attendance and participation are important in grading. There will be two assigned books and a reading packet for purchase as well as several films. Students are expected to follow news on the Middle East, especially the New York Times, Washington Post, Christian Science Monitor, BBC, and the Israeli newspaper HaAretz on the Arab-Israeli conflict (www.haaretz.com).
