COURSE OBJECTIVES AND GOALS:

Behavior modification is a comprehensive technology for the improvement of behavior based on scientifically derived and empirically demonstrated principles of learning. Behavior modification has been applied to a wide variety of persons and many different types of issues. This course is designed to impart fundamental knowledge on the philosophy, principles, and procedures of behavior modification and to illustrate its evidence-based application in a variety of areas.

The goals of this course are to:

- o Review elementary principles and procedures of behavior modification
- o Acquaint students with empirical and theoretical underpinnings of the field by providing advanced discussion and references to the classical and current research literature in the field.
 - o Enable students to think about behavior modification critically and creatively
 - o Provide practical know-how skills

TECHNOLOGY:

*Students will be expected to access and use Blackboard on a regular basis (https://gmu.blackboard.com). Important class information, such as the syllabus and weekly quizzes/practicum assignments will be posted here. To access Blackboard, students should use their George Mason email ID and password. *In addition, students should check their GMU email account regularly. Be sure to check that new messages can be received and that you are not over the message limit. You also have the option for your GMU account to be forwarded to another email address.

ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:

You are expected to come to class prepared to discuss and apply the material. In order to make the most out of your learning experience, it is imperative that you are not only present at each class meeting, but are alert, attentive, and ready to learn. Students are required to read (before class) any texts that may be assigned for that week. Class reading assignments will be posted on Blackboard.

Throughout the semester we will have class discussions. You are responsible for being prepared to discuss the material, and are expected to actively participate in discussion with your classmates about

the material. Participation is worth 100 points, and 10% of your final grade, and will be based on your level of engagement. Although I do not grade strictly on attendance, you will not be able to earn the maximum points for participation if you are frequently not present —meaning if you miss a class due to illness, as long as you communicate this with me, it will not affect your grade. I will be taking attendance, so for every two unexcused absences (unexcused meaning you did not communicate the reason you missed class), you will lose 10 points of the 100.

EXAMS:

There will be quizzes for each chapter; there will be 30 quizzes, and each will be worth 20 points, for a total of 600 points, and 60% of your final grade. There will be no mid-term or final exam, just the weekly quizzes.

*There will be NO make-up exams offered for this course. If you anticipate conflict with an exam date, it is the student's responsibility to provide justification, but scheduling an alternate date is at the discretion of the instructor. Similarly, emergency exceptions are at the discretion of the instructor (in the hospital; car accident = emergency; alarm clock did not ring; bad hair day = not an emergency)

PRACTICUM ASSIGNMENTS:

There will be 6 practicum assignments, which will give you an opportunity to "try out" your working knowledge of the materials covered in class. These are graded on a pass/fail basis, and are worth 50 points each, and a total of 300 points, or 30% of your final grade. We will discuss these in class as we do them, so be prepared to discuss your assignment with the rest of the class.

GRADES:

30 Exams: 600 points (20 points each)

Practicum assignments: 300 points (50 points each)

Participation: 100 points

Total Possible Points: 1000 points

GRADE CALCULATION:

For simplicity, the points have been assigned such that a student can track their own grade without any confusing arithmetic acrobatics (hence the even 1000 points). I round to the second decimal, so a grade of 91.49 is considered a 92 (A-), and a grade of 96.03 is a 96 (A).
