Course Goals

By the end of the course, students should be able to

- Identify basic research designs in psychology
- Critically evaluate psychological research
- Communicate research ideas in written form using APA guidelines

Writing Intensive Learning Outcomes

This course has been approved by the Faculty Senate Writing Across the Curriculum Committee to fulfill the writing intensive requirement for the psychology major. You are required to complete at least 3,500 words of graded writing assignments. Details for all assignments will be provided during lab. Writing workshops, with lab instructor feedback and guidance available, will be provided during lab time.

The schedule of due dates is provided below. It is important that you complete all assigned written work for lab. Students who fail to meet the writing intensive requirement (3,500 words) will not pass the Psychology 301 course.

Learning to write within a discipline is closely connected to learning to think like a professional in that discipline. During the lab section of PSYC 301, you will:

- **Write-to-Learn:** students will use informal or formal writing in ways that deepen their awareness of the field of study and its subject matter.
- **Write-to-Communicate:** students will compose one or more written genres specific to the field of study in order to communicate key ideas tailored to specific audiences and purposes; genres may be academic, public, or professional.
- **Write-as-a-process:** students will draft and revise written works based on feedback they receive from instructors and peers, using strategies appropriate to the genre, audience, and purpose.

Grading Overview

The Research Methods lab is 40% of your overall course grade for PSYC 301. The lecture portion of the course is 60%. Your lecture instructor will calculate a final grade for the course based on your performance in the lab and lecture. Lab points are earned from writing assignments and participation in lab activities.

Lab Activities: Activities will be done during most lab sessions, including in-class writing, data collection, data analysis, and discussions. Attending lab and participating in these activities will be an essential component of successfully completing your writing assignments.

Writing Assignments: Details for all writing assignments will be given during lab sessions. Assignments should be turned in via Blackboard before class begins on the specified due date and at the beginning of class as a printed hard copy. In the event you cannot make it to class, please e-mail your instructor with an explanation for your absence prior to the class.

Late Work Policy: You will be allotted 7 "life happens" days to be used at your discretion throughout the entire semester. Each day that an assignment is late will automatically consume one of these days. After you use up all 7 days, assignments submitted late will receive a 10% per day penalty. Non-penalty extensions will be considered in the case of family or health issues or other circumstances outside of your control, but must be requested and approved in advance of the due date in order to waive late penalties. Requests for non-penalty extensions not submitted before the due date will only be considered in extraordinary circumstances. If you miss class, it is important to communicate with your instructor regarding absences and missed assignments to complete that work in a timely manner.

Grade Disputes: If you wish to challenge the merit of an individual grade that you have received on an assignment you must do that within one week of receiving the grade. Ask your instructor to go over the assignment with you and address your concerns. Disputes regarding grades must be brought to the lab instructor's attention within a week of receiving the grade.

Extra Credit: Extra credit is generally not provided in this course. No extra credit opportunity is provided for one student when not provided for all students. Please meet with your instructor promptly if you are having difficulty in this course.

- Details for all assignments will be provided during lab.
- A lab percentage grade will be calculated and shared with your lecture instructor at the end of the semester. To calculate your final lab *percentage* grade, take your total lab points divided by 300 and multiply by 100.
- Your lecture instructor determines your final grade in PSYC 301. There is only one final grade for the course, which is based on both lecture (60%) and lab (40%).

Weekly Class Overview

Each week's class period will loosely follow this schedule:

1. **Homework submission.** Most assignments will be due online before class begins, and hard copies will be collected at the start of class. I'll answer any questions about recent or upcoming homework.
2. **Attendance.** Attendance is taken not for points but to help us if we need to check in on you. It will also help me learn your names, which is always tricky! Though attending class is not technically mandatory, it will be very difficult to succeed in the course without it.
3. **Mini-lecture.** I'll give a little schpiel about upcoming assignments and a refresher on some part of the course content. This usually only takes 30--60 minutes max. Sometimes, we'll also have an interactive activity, usually an experiment related to the assignments.
4. **Bonus activity.** This part is optional! You can usually leave after the lecture (of course, we're all adults; you can leave any time!). Sometimes, I'll have an interactive activity that has something to do with a field of Psychology. Time permitting, depending on interest, etc.
5. **In-class work time.** The entire class period is your time! Often, we'll have plenty of time at the end of class where you can work on assignments and ask me for help/feedback. Sometimes, we'll have guided work sessions in which I'll walk everyone through parts of an assignment.

Course Policies:

However, under **NO** circumstances are you to collectively write papers with another student or use the work of others without proper and accurate citations. This is considered plagiarism and plagiarism of any kind will not be tolerated. It is not permissible to cheat, plagiarize, steal, or lie in matters relating to academic work. Work such as library references, statistics, and reports of the research studies should be **each student's own work**. Quotations in lab reports should be minimal and the appropriate citation must be given. It is the student's responsibility to understand what is meant by plagiarism and to seek guidance prior to submitting assignments. Unless advised by your instructor to use such tools, do not use AI-generated material for your assignments. This is a writing intensive course, and our goal is to strengthen your writing skills. We can not provide you with appropriate feedback to improve your writing if the work is not your own. Academic misconduct is taken seriously and may result in a failing grade on the assignment or in the course and will be reported to the GMU Honor Committee. The instructor for this course reserves the right to enter a failing grade in the lab for any student found guilty of an honor code violation.
