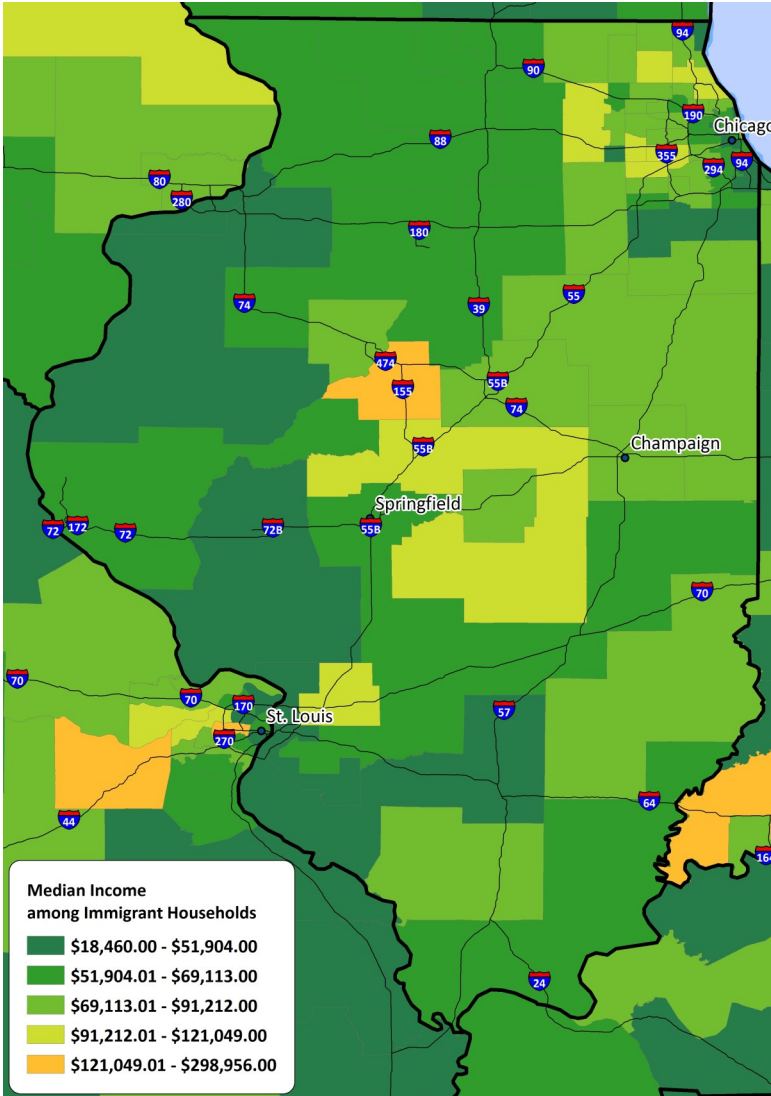

Median Household Income among Immigrant Households in Public Use Microdata Areas of Illinois



The map on the left presents median household income among immigrant households in Public Use Microdata Areas (PUMAs) of Illinois. PUMAs characterized by relatively large median immigrant household incomes are light green and orange, while PUMAs characterized by relatively small median household incomes are dark green. Light green and orange PUMAs are located to the north and east of Springfield, and to the east of St. Louis, Missouri.

Roughly 43 percent of immigrant householders in Illinois were born in Latin America and the Caribbean. Approximately 25 percent of immigrant householders in Illinois were born in Asia. An additional 25 percent of immigrant householders in Illinois were born in Europe. Smaller proportions were born in Africa, North America, Oceania, and other birthplaces.

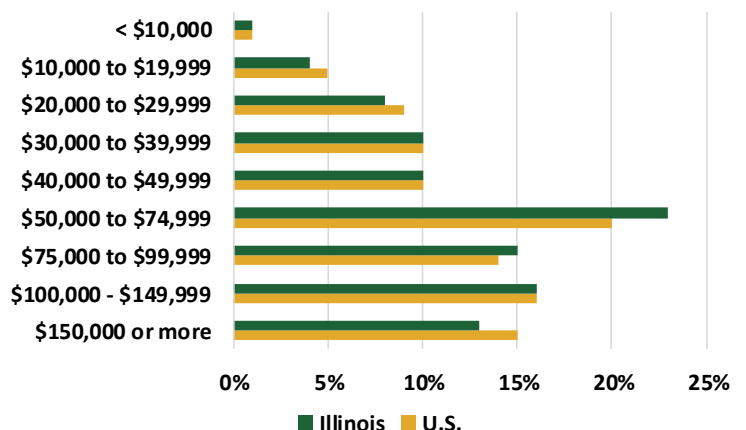
In Illinois, an estimated 67 percent of immigrant households enjoy household incomes of \$50,000 or more. Across the U.S., approximately 65 percent of immigrant households enjoy incomes of \$50,000 or more.

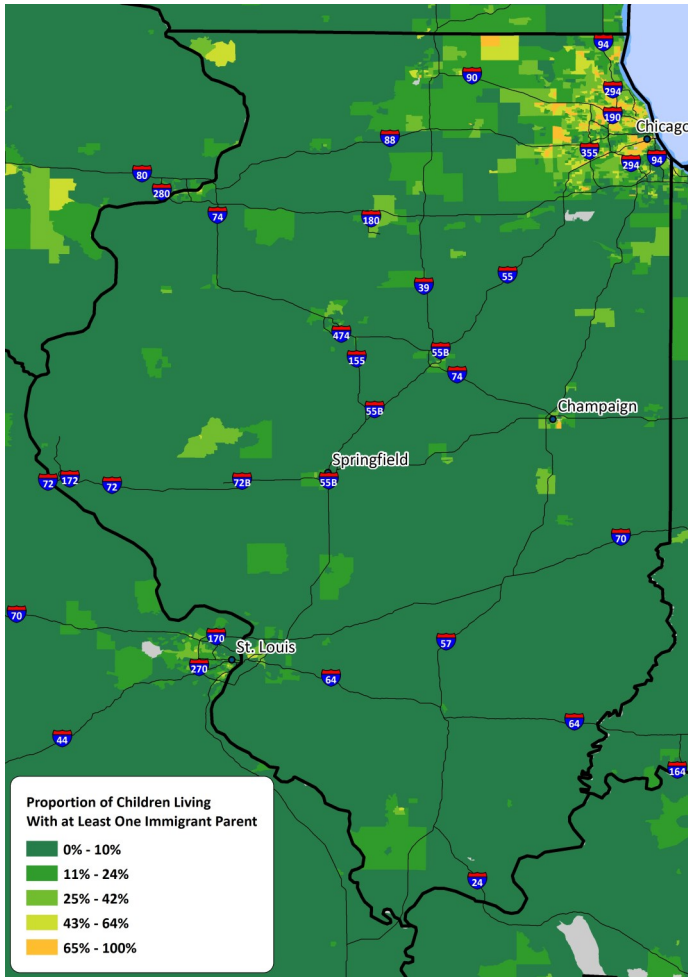

Proportion of Children Living With at Least One Immigrant Parent in Census Tracts of Illinois

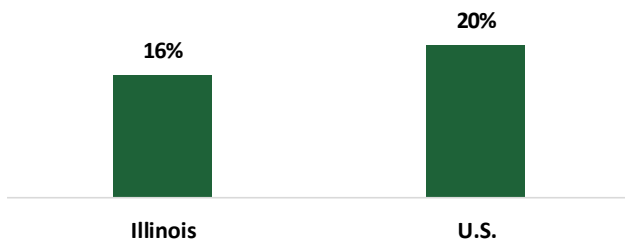


The map on the left presents the proportion of children (ages 0-17) who live with at least one parent in Census tracts of Illinois. Light green and orange Census tracts are characterized by a relatively large proportion of children living with at least one immigrant parent. Light green and orange Census tracts are located in and around Chicago, and in Champaign.

Approximately 16 percent of immigrant householders in Illinois live at or below the federal poverty line. This is compared to roughly 20 percent of immigrant householders across the U.S.

An estimated 42 percent of immigrant households in Illinois contain no children. This is compared to approximately 44 percent of immigrant households across the U.S. Roughly 58 percent of immigrant households in Illinois contain at least 1 child. This is compared to 56 percent of immigrant households across the U.S. These figures point to the interpretation that in Illinois there are more families with 3 or more children, and fewer families with no children.
