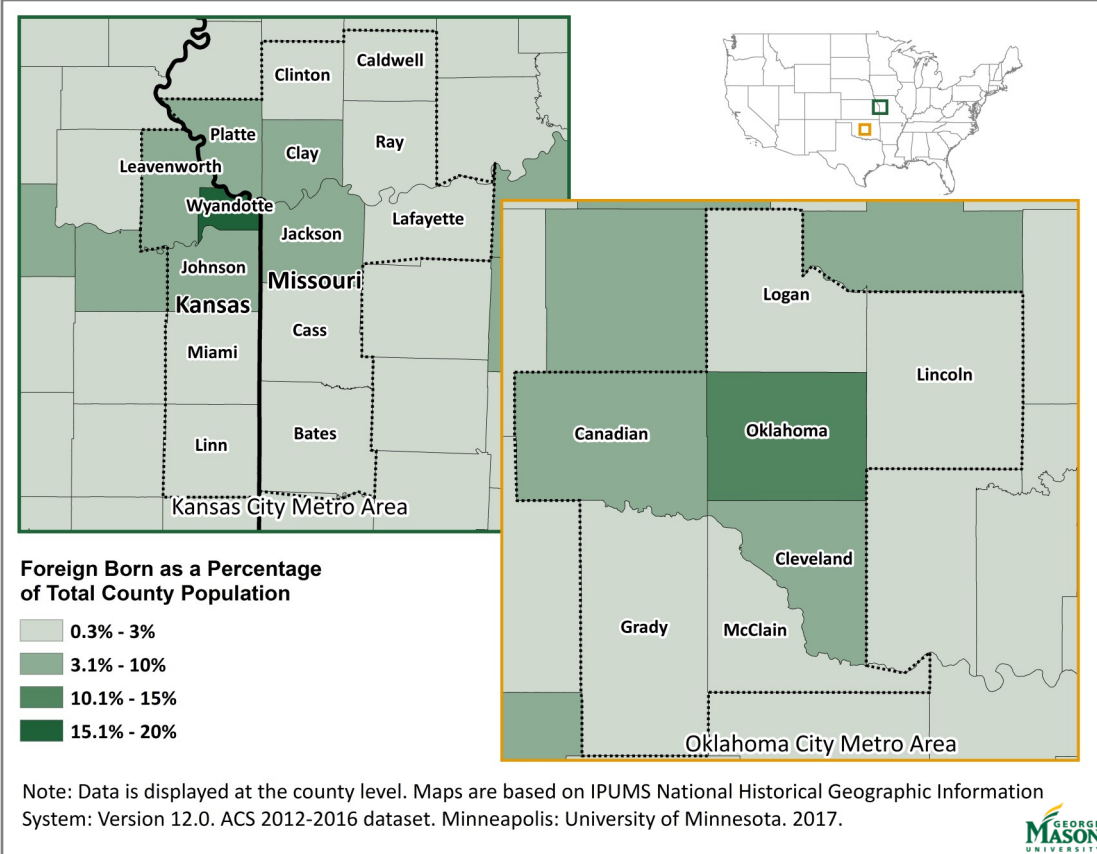


Immigrants in the Kansas City and Oklahoma City Metro Areas

2016 NUMBERS AT A GLANCE

- **42,228,200:** Approximate number of immigrants* living in the U.S. (13% of the population)
- **136,500:** Approximate number of immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area (6% of the metro's population)
- **111,100:** Approximate number of immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area (8% of the metro's population)

Immigrants in the Kansas City and Oklahoma City Metro Areas

Figure 1 shows how the immigrant population is distributed across the Kansas City Metro Area (which includes portions of Kansas and Missouri) and the Oklahoma City Metro Area. Wyandotte County in the Kansas City Metro Area has the highest percentage of foreign-born residents (16%) and Oklahoma County in the Oklahoma City Metro Area has the highest percentage of foreign-born residents (11%).

Figure 2. Poverty Rates Among Immigrants

Poverty

Figure 2 shows that immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area are more likely to live at or above the poverty line compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area.

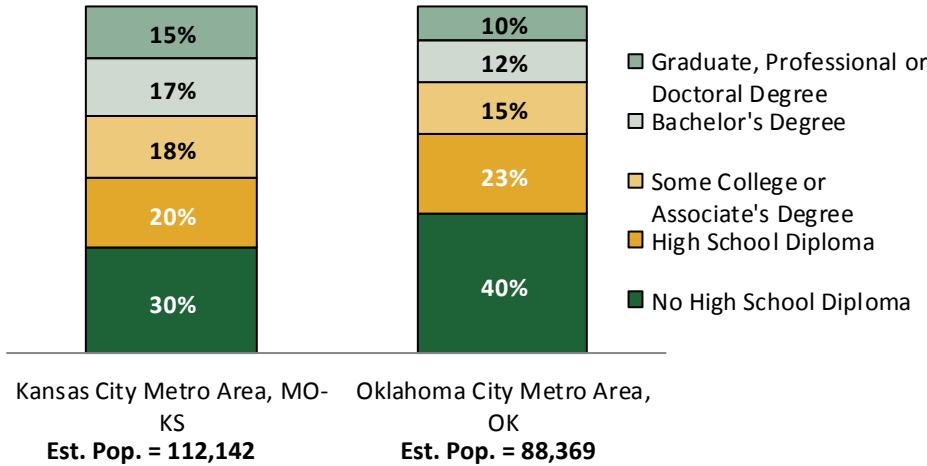

*Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.

Figure 3. Educational Attainment Among Immigrants

Educational Attainment

Figure 3 shows that immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area are better educated compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area. Thirty-two percent of foreign-born individuals living in the Kansas City Metro Area have a Bachelor's degree or higher, which is much higher compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area (22%).

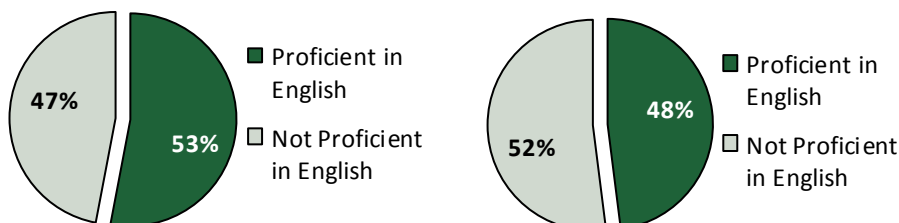

Personal Income

Figure 4 shows that immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area are less likely to earn less than \$40,000, and reported earning higher median personal incomes (\$33,455) compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area (\$30,414).

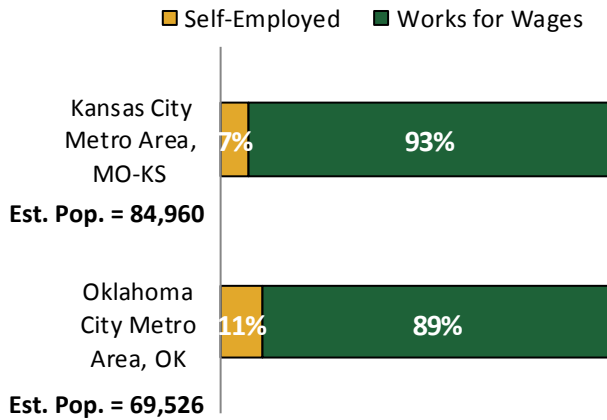

English Proficiency

Figure 5 shows that immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area reported higher rates of English proficiency (speak only English or speak English very well) compared to immigrants in the Oklahoma City Metro Area.

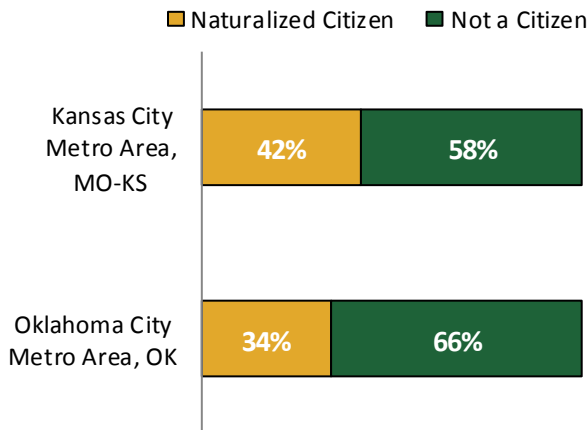
Figure 6. Self-Employment Rates Among Immigrants

Self-Employment

Figure 6 shows that immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area reported lower rates of self-employment (7%) compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area (11%).

Citizenship Status

Figure 7 shows that 42 percent of immigrants living in the Kansas City Metro Area are naturalized citizens, which is higher compared to immigrants living in the Oklahoma City Metro Area (34%). However, the percentages of naturalized citizens in both metro areas are lower than that in United States (47%).
