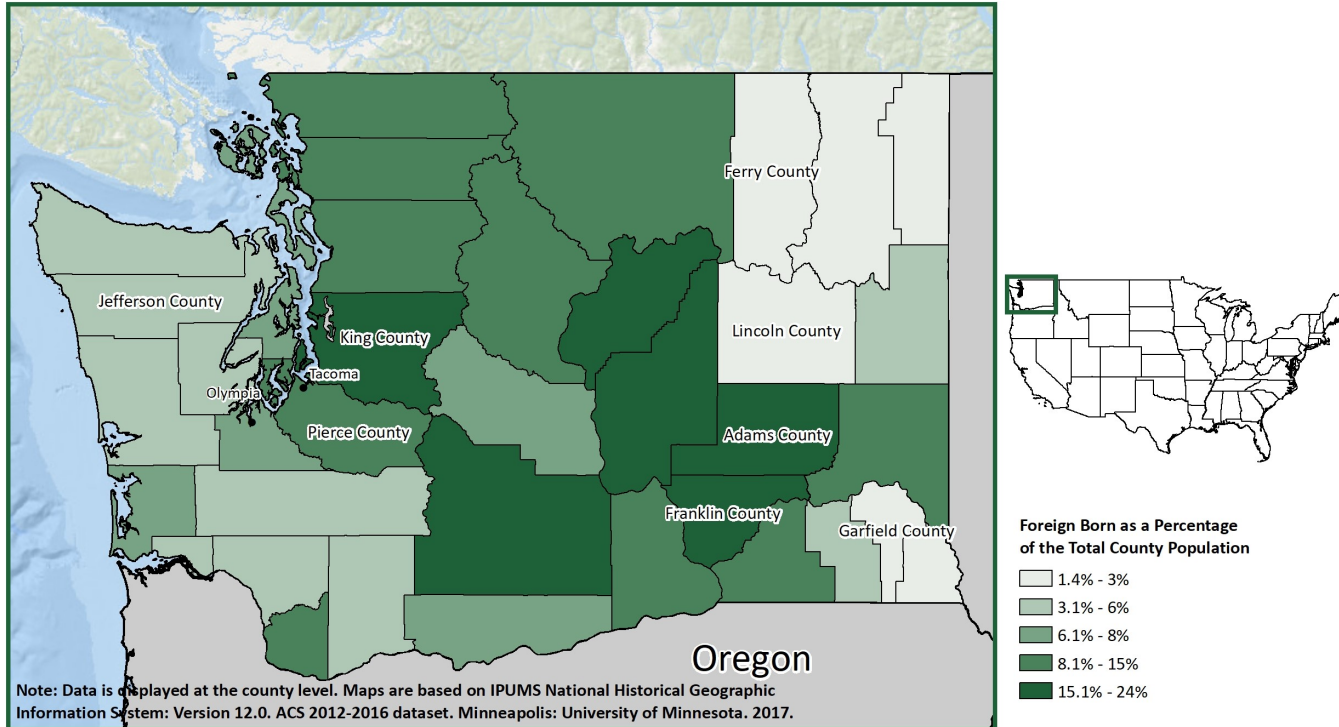


Immigrants in Pierce County, Washington

2016 NUMBERS AT A GLANCE

- **42,228,200:** Approximate number of immigrants* living in the U.S. (13% of the population)
- **955,400:** Approximate number of immigrants living in the state of Washington (14% of the state's population)
- **80,400:** Approximate number of immigrants living in Pierce County, WA (10% of the county's population)
- **13th:** Rank of the state of Washington among the 50 states and Washington, D.C. in terms of immigrants as a percentage of the state's population

Distribution of Immigrants in the State of Washington

Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the state of Washington. Pierce County has a foreign-born population of 80,300, which represents 10 percent of the county's population. It represents the 16th largest county in Washington in terms of immigrants as a share of the county population. Adams County, Franklin County, and King County reported the highest shares of immigrants in the state of Washington. Adams County has an immigrant population of 4,500, or 24 percent of the population. Franklin County has a foreign-born population of 19,700, which accounts for 22 percent of the county's population. King County has an immigrant population of 448,300, which also accounts for 22 percent of the population. Immigrants make up the smallest shares of the population in Garfield County, Ferry County, and Lincoln County.

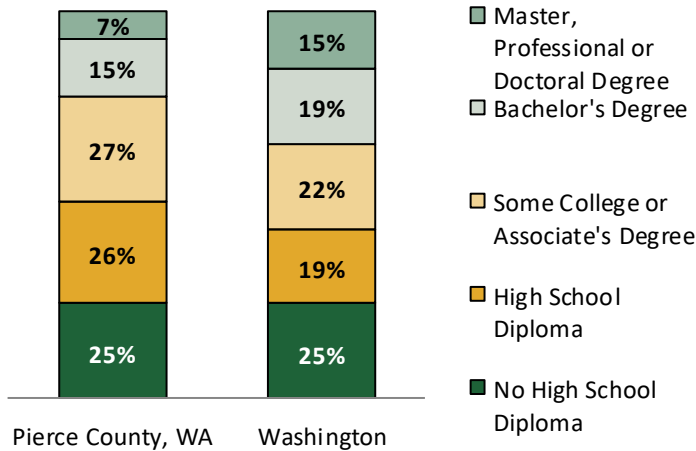

¹Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.

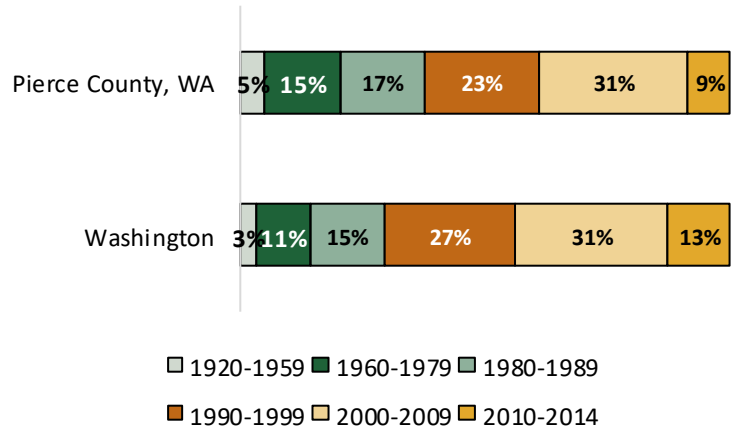
Figure 2. Educational Attainment Among Immigrants

Educational Attainment

Figure 2 shows that immigrants living in Pierce County, WA reported lower rates of educational attainment compared to all other immigrants in Washington. Immigrants in Washington are much more likely to have obtained a bachelor's degree or higher (34 percent) compared to immigrants in Pierce County, WA (22 percent).

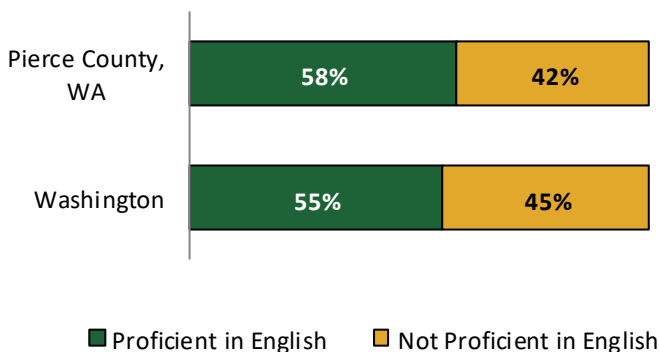
Figure 3. Year of Immigration Among Immigrants



Year of Immigration

Immigrants in Pierce County, WA reported arriving United States slightly earlier compared to all other immigrants in Washington. Forty percent of immigrants living in Pierce County, WA arrived in the United States since 2000 compared to 44 percent of all other immigrants living Washington.

English Proficiency

Figure 4 shows immigrants living in Pierce County reported higher English proficiency rate compared to all other immigrants living in Washington State. Approximately 58 percent immigrants living in Pierce County are proficient in English (speaks only English or speaks English very well).

Poverty

Immigrants living in Pierce County, WA are slightly more likely to report living below the poverty line (17 percent) compared to all other immigrants in Washington (16 percent).

Race and Ethnicity

Approximately 40 percent of the immigrants living in Pierce County identified as Asian compared to 38% of all other immigrants in the state of Washington. Approximately 26 percent of immigrants in Pierce County identified as Hispanic, compared to 29 percent of all other immigrants in Washington.
