Figure 1. Immigration Status Among Black Individuals




Figure 1 shows that the estimated population of individuals living in Loudoun County and identify as black is 27,758. Fifteen percent of them are foreign born and 85 percent native born.

Figure 2. Household Income Among African Americans and Black Immigrants




Figure 2 shows that black immigrant-headed households in Loudoun County are slightly more likely to earn \$75,000 or more compared to native-born African American-headed households. However, African American-headed households in Loudoun reported higher median household incomes (\$109,280) compared to black immigrant-headed households in the same area (\$102,900).

*Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.
