

2018 NUMBERS AT A GLANCE

- 43,567,000: Approximate number of immigrants¹ living in the U.S. (13% of the population)
- 10,552,400: Approximate number of immigrants living in California (27% of the total population)
- 745,600: Approximate number of immigrants living in Santa Clara County (39% of the total population)
- 15%: Estimated increase in the number of immigrants living in Santa Clara County over the past 10 years
- 1st: Rank of the state of California among the 50 states and Washington, DC in terms of immigrants as a percentage of the state's population




Distribution of Immigrants in California

Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the state of California as a percent of the total county's population. Santa Clara (39 percent), San Mateo (35 percent), and San Francisco (34 percent) Counties reported the highest percentages of immigrants in this state. Shasta, Humboldt, and Butte Counties reported the lowest percentages of immigrants in the state.

Year of Immigration

Figure 2 shows that 70 percent of immigrants in Santa Clara County arrived in the United States between 1990 and 2016 compared to 67 percent of immigrants living in the rest of the United States. The median year of arrival for foreign-born individuals in Santa Clara County is 1998 whereas for foreign born living in the rest of the United States is 1997.

¹Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.




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

Country of Origin

Figure 3 shows that Mexico, India, Vietnam, China, and the Philippines are the top five countries of birth among immigrants living in Santa Clara County. In the rest of the United States, the largest share of foreign-born individuals come from Mexico, India, China, the Philippines, and El Salvador.



Self Employment

The foreign born in Santa Clara County are slightly less likely to be self-employed compared to all other immigrants in the United States (Figure 4). Six percent of the foreign born living in Santa Clara County are self-employed but not incorporated, which may indicate that they are independent contractors, and 2 percent have their own business. In contrast, 8 percent of all other immigrants in the rest of the United States are self-employed but not incorporated and 4 percent have their own business.

Occupation and Industry

Figure 5 highlights the top five occupational and industry groups² among immigrants in Santa Clara County and all other immigrants living in the United States. Immigrants in Santa Clara County work in slightly different occupations compared to all other immigrants in the United States. The largest share of immigrants in Santa Clara County works in computer, engineering, and science occupations (can be working in any industry) compared to all other immigrants in the United States who are more likely to work in service occupations. With regards to industries, immigrants in Santa Clara County tend to work in similar industries (workers in industries can be of any occupation) as all other immigrants in the United States, with larger share of immigrants in Santa Clara County working in manufacturing and professional, scientific, and technical services industry compared to all other immigrants in the United States.
