Academic Policies for BAM Students → Graduate Students

Students enrolled in Bachelors Accelerated Master's (BAM) programs continue to have undergraduate student status and abide by the undergraduate policies within the University Catalog. The following are reminders of policies specifically for students currently enrolled in a BAM:

- **Credit Limit** A maximum of eighteen (18) graduate credits may be taken within a BAM program. Students may apply twelve (12) graduate credits to their undergraduate degree considered "advanced standing" courses and take an additional six (6) graduate credits to be held in reserve and apply only to the graduate degree. Students should work with their undergraduate advisor and graduate advisor each semester as a BAM student to ensure that they are on track and balancing workloads appropriately.
- **Registration** BAM students are classified as "Junior Plus" or "Senior Plus" and therefore have priority registration. Many graduate programs have controlled courses so students should consult with their program advisors about permission to enroll each semester.
- Grading Undergraduate courses taken while a BAM student follow the undergraduate
 grading policies in the University Catalog while graduate courses taken in the BAM program
 adhere to the graduate grading expectations outlined in the table below. BAM students
 must be familiar with the grade requirements in both their graduate courses taken in
 advanced standing and their overall GPA requirement for continuing in the BAM program.

- Undergraduate Degree Conferral BAM students must work with their program advisor to submit the Bachelor's/Accelerated Master's Transition form (available on the Registrar's forms page) by the last day to add classes of their final undergraduate semester. This form designates how the graduate level courses taken while an undergraduate should be applied toward the master's program. The process includes:
 - 1. Apply for graduation (BA/BS) within Patriot Web
 - 2. Obtain undergraduate advisor signature on the BAM Transition Form
 - 3. Obtain graduate advisor signature on the BAM Transition form
 - 4. Submit form for Graduate Dean (assistant/associate) signature to CHSS Academic Affairs

It is important to become familiar with a few key graduate policies below, which are applicable once students have transitioned to full graduate student status, the semester immediately following conferral of the undergraduate degree:

- Classification Graduate students are considered full time if they are enrolled in at least 9 graduate credits per semester or hold a full-time assistantship (total 20 hours a week) and are enrolled in at least 6 graduate credits per semester.
- **Credit Limit** Graduate students may enroll in a maximum of 12 credit hours per semester.
 - Students who wish to enroll in additional hours must complete a Graduate Course Overload Request form. Students must first obtain permission from their graduate program director.
- **Time Limit** Master's degree students have six years from the time of first enrollment as a degree-seeking student to complete their degrees. International students attending in F-1 or J-1 status also have more restrictive time limits; contact the Office of International Programs and Services for information (https://oips.gmu.edu/).

• Registration

- Course Withdrawal For graduate students, withdrawal after the last day to drop a course requires approval by the student's academic dean, and is permitted only for non-academic reasons that prevent course completion.
- Selective Withdrawals are not permitted for graduate students.
- Repeating a Course Graduate students who have passed a course with a satisfactory grade (B-) are not permitted to repeat the course for replacement credit unless the academic program specifies a higher minimum satisfactory grade.
 Students must obtain permission from their program to repeat a course in which they have earned an unsatisfactory grade.

Grading

- Although a B- is a satisfactory grade for a course, students must maintain a 3.00 average in their degree program and present a 3.00 GPA on the courses listed on the graduation application.
- Academic Warning A notation of academic warning is entered on the transcript of a graduate student who receives a grade of C or F in a graduate course or while a grade of IN is in effect.
- Academic Dismissal A degree-seeking graduate student is dismissed after accumulating grades of F in two courses or a total of 9 credits of unsatisfactory grades (C or below) in graduate courses.
- Graduation Students must be registered during the semester in which they intend to
 graduate. Graduate Intent must be filed through Patriot Web according to the semester
 deadlines. After filing intent, students should update their current mailing address, phone
 number, and email address in Patriot Web and ensure all "IP" (In Progress) and "IN"
 (Incomplete) grades are resolved by the end of the semester.

Plagiarism and Academic Resources

Mason's Office of Academic Integrity provides the following description of plagiarism (https://oai.gmu.edu/mason-honor-code/what-is-plagiarism/):

Plagiarism is defined as using another individual's ideas or words without attribution or credit. It also includes using one's own prior work that has been submitted for credit or published in another venue as a new submission without citation. Using the ideas of others without proper attribution or citation is unethical and a violation of the Honor Code. Subcategories of plagiarism include:

- Self-plagiarism: Intentionally or unintentionally using portions of one's old work for new assignments without attribution
- Failure to adequately quote and/or cite sources or material
- False citation: This includes but is not limited to referencing work that does not appear in the indicated source.

Plagiarism does not include mistakes in the format of a citation as long as the student has indicated the materials quoted or relied upon and the source of the materials.
