






# Distribution of Immigrants

Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the Columbus metro area and Jacksonville metro area. Franklin County reported the highest percentage of immigrants in the Columbus metro area (10.6%) and Duval County reported the highest percentage of immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area (10.8%).

<sup>1</sup>Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.

# Immigrants in the Columbus, OH Metropolitan Area and the Jacksonville, FL Metropolitan Area

#### **Country of Birth**

Figure 2 shows that India and Mexico are among the top five countries of birth of immigrants in the Columbus and Jacksonville metro areas. Immigrants in the Columbus metro area are also more likely to come from China, whereas immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area are more likely to come from the Philippines and Cuba.


#### Language Spoken at Home


English and Spanish are the top two languages spoken at home among immigrants in the Columbus metro area and the Jacksonville metro area, as shown in Figure 3. However, immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area are more likely to speak Spanish as their primary language at home compared to immigrants in the Columbus metro area. Immigrants in the Columbus metro area are more likely to speak a Dravidian language or Chinese at home compared to immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area.

# Race and Ethnicity<sup>2</sup>


#### Figure 4. Race and Ethnicity Among Immigrants

Figure 4 indicates that the largest share of immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area identify as white, and the largest share of the foreign born in the Columbus metro area identify as Asian, likely because of their Indian or Chinese origins (see Figure 2). With respect to ethnicity, 28 percent of immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area identify themselves as Hispanic (who can be of any race) while in the Columbus metro area, 17 percent of immigrants identify themselves as Hispanic.

#### **Year of Immigration**


#### Figure 5. Year of Immigration Among Immigrants

Figure 5 shows that immigrants in the Columbus metro area arrived later in the United States compared to immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area. Sixty-five percent of foreign born living in the Columbus metro area arrived in the United States after the year of 1999 compared to forty-nine percent of foreign born living in the Jacksonville metro area. The median year of arrival for immigrants in the Columbus metro area is 2004 whereas for the foreign born the Jacksonville is 1999.

#### **English Proficiency**

A majority of immigrants in both metro areas report being proficient in English, as indicated in Figure 6. Immigrants in the Columbus metro area report a slightly lower English proficiency rate (62 percent) compared to immigrants in the Jacksonville metro area (63 percent).
