

Immigrants in Kent County, Michigan





Distribution of Immigrants

Figure 1 shows where immigrants live in the state of Michigan. Oakland County (13%), Washtenaw County (12%), and Macomb County (11%) reported the highest percentages of immigrants in Michigan. Schoolcraft County (1%), Tuscola County (1%), and Gladwin County (1%) reported the lowest percentages of immigrants in Michigan. Notably, Kent County ranks 6th in Michigan in terms of percentage of immigrants (9%).

¹Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.

Country of Birth

Figure 2 shows that Mexico is the top one country of birth of immigrants in Kent County, MI and the rest of the United States. Immigrants in Kent County are also more likely to come from Guatemala and Vietnam compared to immigrants in the rest of the United States.




Language Spoken at Home

English and Spanish are the top two languages spoken at home among immigrants in Kent County, MI and the rest of the United States, as shown in Figure 3. However, immigrants in Kent County are more likely to speak Vietnamese or a Serbo-Croatian/Yugoslavian/ Slavonian language at home compared to immigrants in the rest of the United States. This is consistent with immigrants in Kent County, MI being more likely to come from Vietnam and Bosnia, as Figure 2 indicates.

Naturalization Rate

Figure 4 indicates that immigrants in Kent County, MI are less likely to be naturalized citizens compared to the rest of the United States. Nearly half of the immigrants in the United States are naturalized citizens, as compared to 41 percent in Kent County, MI.

Year of Immigration





Figure 5. Year of Immigration Among Immigrants

Figure 5 shows that immigrants in Kent County, MI arrived in the United States more recently compared to immigrants in the rest of the United States. More than half of the foreign born living in Kent County arrived in the United States after the year 1999. The median year of arrival for immigrants in Kent County is 2000, compared to 1999 for the rest of the United States.

Figure 4. Naturalization Rates Among Immigrants

Poverty Rates

A majority of immigrants in Kent County, MI and the rest of the United States report living at or above the poverty line, as indicated in Figure 6. Immigrants in Kent County, MI report a slightly higher poverty rate (18 percent) compared to immigrants in the United States (16 percent).
