B. MAJOR REQUIREMENTS

a. Core Courses. Students must earn a grade of C or better in each of the core courses.

1. GLOA 101: Introduction to Global Affairs or SOCI 120: Globalization & Society
2. GOVT 322: International Relations Theory (*Prerequisite: GOVT 132 or GOVT 133*)
3. CONF 340: Global Conflict Analysis and Resolution
4. ECON 385: International Economic Policy
5. CULT 320: Globalization and Culture (*Prerequisite: GLOA 101, cannot be a freshmen*)
6. EVPP 337: Environmental Policy Making in Developing Countries
7. GLOA 400: Global Affairs Capstone

b. Language Requirement. Students must complete Steps 1 **and** 2, and earn grade of C- or better in each course.

1. *Step 1—Intermediate Proficiency in a Foreign Language:* students must complete through or transfer credit the completion of 202, SPAN 212, SPAN 215, EDSE 219 **OR** demonstrate equivalent proficiency in a foreign language through a proficiency test (please see: <http://mcl.gmu.edu/placement-testing>).
2. *Step 2—Language Electives (Choose Any Language at Any Level):* students must complete 6 additional foreign language credits **OR** demonstrate appropriate proficiency in a second foreign language.

c. Concentration (12 credits). Students must earn a grade of C- or better in each of the courses.

Students choose **one concentration in either a global theme or a world region** and take twelve credits; courses in a concentration must come from at least two different departments or programs. The courses must be unique and cannot be applied to any other major, minor, concentration, or certificate program. For any concentration, study abroad and globally oriented internships can reduce the credits required in the concentration.
