Degree Notes

Students complete the 39 required credits required for major requirements with electives in PSYC with the following restrictions: no more than six (6) credits of D may be applied; see catalog for maximum credit restrictions on courses that may be applied to psychology credits.

At least 24 out of 39 PSYC credits required for major requirements must be at the 300/400-level. Courses taken to fulfill the Basic Courses in Psychology requirements may simultaneously fulfill a concentration.

Students must earn a minimum of C in all coursework applied to the concentration.

All students must complete at least one course designated "writing intensive" in their majors at the 300 level or above. Students majoring in Psychology may fulfill this requirement by successfully completing PSYC 301, 304, or 309. Any remaining credits may be completed with elective courses to bring the degree total to 120 with 45 of these credits at the 300/400 level.
