




Figure 1. National Women's Soccer League Locations




Figure 3. Birthplace of NWSL Players by Team

The NWSL teams with the largest shares of foreign-born players include the Orlando Pride (34%), Angel City FC (29%), and Houston Dash (23%). Conversely, the teams with the lowest shares of foreign-born players include the Washington Spirit (10%), Kansas City Current (12%), and the Chicago Red Stars (13%).

Nearly **three-fourths (73%)** of immigrant NWSL players were born in countries in Europe, North America (Canada), or Asia.

- In 2022, more than half (58%) of NWSL players were born in Canada, England, Japan, Brazil, or Australia.
- In 2020, immigrants from these five countries comprised only 5% of the foreign-born population in the United States.
- In 2020, the top five countries of birth among immigrants in the United States include Mexico (24%), India (6%), China (5%), Philippines (4%), and Vietnam (3%).

Analysis in this fact sheet is based on source data from the U.S. Census Bureau American Community Survey, 2020 distributed through IPUMS-USA, University of Minnesota, www.ipums.org as well as source data from the individual team rosters on the NWLS website (www.nwslsoccer.com). Team rosters were accessed on September 1, 2022 and reflect the players who were on each team on that date.

Please note that the terms "immigrant" and "foreign born" are used interchangeably throughout this fact sheet. Foreign born refers to individuals who are not a U.S. citizen at birth or who were born outside the U.S., Puerto Rico or other U.S. territories and whose parents are not U.S. citizens. The foreign born may include naturalized U.S. citizens, Legal Permanent Residents, temporary residents, refugees and asylees, and others. Additionally, native born includes those who are U.S. citizens at birth, those born in the United States, Puerto Rico, or other U.S. territories, and those born abroad to a parent who is a U.S. citizen.





The Immigrants, Athletes, and Inclusion Initiative
