Program Highlights

War and the Military in Society (WMS) equips students with skills and knowledge to evaluate, analyze, and solve problems related to the use of organized violence surrounding the instruments of national defense, including questions of:

- national security
- international relations
- defense policymaking
- domestic policy
- fiscal policy
- legal policy
- social policy

Students use historical and contemporary case studies to better understand the dilemmas and opportunities facing policymakers and military professionals. Recent events have demonstrated the degree to which military issues affect social groups, global politics, and the world economy. The ways that armies are raised and funded, the reasons troops serve, the conditions military personnel and civilians endure during wartime, and the ways that nations conceive their military apparatus all have direct bearing on future policy decisions.

Students access faculty and their expertise across the university including the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter School for Peace and Conflict Resolution and the Schar School of Policy and Government.
