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#### II. Course Overview

**Catalog Description:** Introduces economic way of thinking on trade and international finance. Presents historical and current information on consequences of trade and protectionism.

## **Assignment Descriptions:**

Short Assignments- Each week this semester there will be short assignments that may include a problem set, a brief essay question, and/or a reading summary. All assignments will be uploaded to the Blackboard site. **These will be due on Tuesdays at noon and late short assignments will not be accepted** but your lowest grades will be dropped when calculating the final grade for these assignments.

Policy Blog – Each student must complete 1 blog post and create 3 comments on 3 different blog posts that all address international economic policy. Students will be assigned a topic (trade policy, immigration, or foreign aid policy) and a due date for their post. The post should be a brief summary of an **opinion article** written by a professional economist. The summary should explain the policy recommendation given in the opinion article. A comment should include a reference to a source to a **news article** or **government report** that is related to the post. The comment should explain why the source is related to the post.
