1. Course Description

This course will give an overview of the major currents and trends of the Arts of Asia, from the Indus Valley civilization to the nomadic art of the steppes, the brilliant Bronze Age in China, the early Buddhist culture and its spread across the Asian continent, and the rise of unique painting and ceramic traditions in East Asia. The interplay of various ideas and styles in architecture, painting, sculpture, and ceramics will reveal an active and selective process of transmission, appropriation, and localization of artistic styles and traditions through time and space.

- Familiarity with basic principles of Asian religion and thought as they pertain to the visual arts
- Understanding the relationship between the history and culture of each region and its art
- Practice in describing, researching, analyzing and writing about art objects
