Course Overview

First half of a course surveying concepts and principles of neuroscience—including basic neuroanatomy, neural and synaptic transmission, and neural mechanisms of behavior. In this 8-week course, we will review what we know about the brain, how it guides sensory processes, and future areas of research opportunity.

In this course, students will (1) learn the fundamental principles and theories of neuroscience and the neural underpinnings of the senses; (2) approach topics in psychology and neuroscience critically by learning how psychologists develop and test hypotheses; (3) apply in-class concepts to everyday situations.

Course Requirements

Retention Checks (x3, 20 points each, 60 total points)

You will complete three retention checks that review content from chapters and lectures/slides.

Meme/GIF/Blurb (x2, 5 points each, 10 points total)

Your first assignment for this class is to find and submit one or more memes/GIFs/short blurb describing how you feel going into the course. Your last assignment is to also submit one or more memes/GIFs describing how you feel about the course at the end.

Comm Tasks (x5, 6 points each, 30 points total)

Effective communication skills are necessary in navigating academia (and every other realm of our lives). Throughout the session, you will be expected to complete a range of tasks that facilitate our communication skills.

Retention Check #1 covers chapters 2-5, Retention Check #2 covers chapters 6 and 7, Retention Check #3 covers chapters 8-12.

Comm(unication) Tasks (30%)

Given that communication is a key element to navigating the academic and social world, it is pivotal that we develop our skills in interacting with one another. We will cover important ground like email etiquette (i.e., emailing faculty), paraphrasing information (e.g., abandoning the tendency to quote excerpts of text directly), and others.
