

This class is designed as part lecture and part discussion with emphasis on the interaction between the Christian East, the Muslim World and the Christian West. We will examine primary sources (in translation) and secondary sources that render a wide spectrum of ideologies and scholarship on the crusading movement. Emphasis will be on themes of cultural transmission, warfare and colonization between competing societies from Western Europe, Byzantium and the Middle East.

## **Assignments and Grades**

1. Participation in class discussion counts for 10% of the grade. Students are expected to arrive in class having prepared the assigned readings and ready for discussion.

- 2. Bibliographic essay Each student must prepare 4-5 page bibliographic essay on the topic of his/her final paper. This essay must be turned in on March 7 [20% of your final grade]. It must identify the topic of the final essay and the scholarship that is relevant to the discussion in the form of an annotated bibliography.
- 3. Oral Presentations Each student must participate in two oral presentations based on themes from two separate class meetings during the semester. Class presentations may be done in groups. Each presentation may not exceed 20 minutes and should expand discussion on themes presented by the instructor during the initial portion of the class meeting that week. Each student participating in a class presentation will turn in the subsequent week a 5 page review of the presentation highlighting the main points and incorporating the insights gained from class discussion the week of his/her presentation. [Each paper will count for 15% and each presentation will account for 5% of your grade a total of 40%]
- 4. On May 2 students will be responsible for a 5 minute oral presentation summarizing briefly the paper topic and discussing the results of their study. The Final paper will be a research essay due no later than May 9 at the class meeting. The papers should be approximately 12-15 pages in length, double spaced, with footnotes/endnotes and bibliography. [30% of your total grade].

Class participation constitutes a significant part of your grade. If you cannot attend class you must notify the instructor in advance, if possible, and make every effort to keep up with the work of each week's reading assignments.
