Course Description

CHIN300 is designed for advanced students of Chinese or equivalent is required. With a focus on reading skills, this course continues to expand students' vocabulary and grammar and develop students' ability in using the newly learned vocab and grammar in all four skills, i.e., listening, speaking, reading, and writing. HSK (Level 3~4) grammar part questions may also be used in this class as supplementary materials.

Course Objectives

Students are expected to develop a solid grasp of more complex Chinese reading skills and syntax through


- further develop character knowledge and both receptive and productive vocabulary.
- develop a solid grasp of more complex Chinese syntax.
- further develop all four skills in speaking, listening, reading, writing
- begin to become familiar with the differences between spoken and written language.
- learn to appreciate Chinese culture as an integral part of the Chinese language.

Course Requirements & Rules

- 1. Class Participation (Attendance): Attendance at class meetings is crucial. Students should keep in mind that part of their grade is based on participation and that absences count against them regardless of the reasons. Participate actively in class with the teacher and your classmates. There will be no penalty for the first two missed classes. After that, however, each absence will reduce the final grade by one percentage point. (That is, three absences over the course of the semester will result in a ten-percentage point subtraction from the final grade, so even perfect scores on all tests and homework will result in a "B").
- 2. **Preview the material before the class**: Students are expected to prepare **beforehand** the material to be covered in class, such as new vocabulary, grammar, and sentence patterns. A detailed session-by-session schedule is provided for this purpose.
- 3. **Use of electronic devices**: Before each class, please remember to silence or turn off any electronic devices, especially cell phones. No calls or texting during class. If you must use your cell phone during class time for a personal emergency, please leave the room without disturbing the class. You may use your laptops or tablets to take notes and look up information pertinent to our class topics. You may NOT use this opportunity to



complete tasks that are not related to our class, play games, surf the internet or chat with your friends on social media or elsewhere. In the event that this opportunity is abused, you will be asked to leave the classroom immediately. No cell phones or other electronic equipment during all quizzes and exams.

- 4. **Tests**: There will be a test after each lesson. The lowest score on a test (including zero for a missed test) will be dropped when calculating the final grade. There will be no make-up test or test taken in advance, unless the student has a legitimate reason and informs the instructor in a timely fashion.
- 5. **Homework**: Homework will be due **no later** than the day of chapter test. Late homework will be corrected, but no credit will be given for it. Check blackboard on a regular base.
- 6. **Mid & Final Exam:** The written mid exam will cover all the lessons before mid-term, and final exams at the end of the semester will cover all the lessons after mid-term exam.
- 7. **Presentation:** There will be two presentations. The first one is an individual presentation. Each student is required to give a presentation (draft is required) of approximately 3-4 minutes in front of the class on a topic of his or her choice but closely relating to the topics studies in class. The second presentation is a group project. Each group (2-3 people) is required to submit a video clip (3min/ person). Students should try to incorporate as much of the studied material/ grammar/ vocabulary as possible, but they can be creative in devising form and content of the presentation. Students are required to submit a draft of the proposed presentation to the instructor in advance. Rubrics will be given in class.
- 8. **Extra Credits:** Some Extra Credit activities/reports will be offered to anyone who would like to go extra miles to learn in more depth about modern Chinese language and culture. However, no extra credit points will be accepted after the final exam.

There are three ways to earn extra credits in the course:

- Students are highly encouraged to learn Chinese outside of the course curriculum, by watching Chinese movies, TV shows or listening to Chinese music. You can earn extra credit by writing a reflection or do a recorded presentation on these activities.
- Students are highly encouraged to share with the class the Chinese TVs, movies, or music you enjoy! I will start the class meetings 10 minutes early each time. Share with us a short video (less than 5 minutes) and talk about it!
- Sometimes we are going to play Quizlet Live in class to help review vocab. The winner will be awarded extra credit!
