COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores the Korean language at the intermediate level. Students should have taken Korean 201 to take this course. In this course, students will learn the basic communication skills necessary to engage in daily conversations and learn more complicated grammar including verbal connective, causal connective, adjectives, command, comparison, negation, suggestion, and obligation form. In addition, students will be improving their reading and writing skills although the class is more focused on speaking and listening skills. In addition to language, students will learn about the daily cultural practices in Korea through the textbook and other materials provided by the instructor. As a class project, students will work on a video project where they can write their script and practice until they sound natural.

LEARNING GOAL

This course aims to improve Korean language skills by equipping students with vocabulary, expressions, and grammar at the intermediate level. It will help students to engage in daily conversation in Korean and improve their social and cultural knowledge of Korea.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOME (SLO)

By the end of this course, the students will be able to:

- 1) Comprehend simple texts written in Korean.
- 2) Write about their personal experiences related to various topics.
- 3) Engage in face-to-face conversations on broader topics of daily life.
- 4) Learn more about Korean culture not only through the class materials provided by the instructor but also through communication and collaborative work with classmates.
- 5) Formulate and use an intermediate-level speech in accordance with ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines.

A. Attendance and Participation

Class attendance is required. Students should be present in class before the instructor calls the roll and will be marked as late if they come after their name is called. Three lates will be counted as one absence. Students will lose one point from the final grade each time they are absent after three absences, and more than ten absences will result in course failure. Please know that missing classes will not only affect your attendance grade negatively but also other grades such as participation, quizzes, etc. There can be legitimate absences including family emergencies, job

interviews, serious illness, religious holidays, or athletic commitments. In this case, please contact the instructor as early as possible. All legitimate absences require proper official documents such as doctor's notes, or official letters.

Students are expected to arrive on time, remain attentive, and participate actively in the discussion. It also includes attentive watching and listening to screenings of films or other media shown in class, and respectful listening when your peers are speaking. Demonstrate your ability to fully engage in your learning without texting, checking your phone or email, or participating in other digital distractions. Participation points will be taken away if you are unable to meet the above criteria.

B. Weekly Quizzes and Assignments

Weekly quizzes will be given at the beginning of the class, either once or twice a week. A typical quiz consists of ten to fifteen questions covering simple words, phrases, expressions, conjugations, listening comprehension, or dictation. **There is no make-up** for the missed quizzes, so students shouldn't be late for class.

Weekly Assignments include workbook drills, compositions, and handouts that students need to finish and submit to the instructor. Students are expected to submit the workbook assignments whenever they finished each chapter. All assignments should be completed and submitted within the given due dates. Late submissions will be accepted but with a penalty.

C. Video Project

Students will make a video while making use of the Korean language expressions they learned during the class. Students are expected to write their own script and submit it two weeks before they start shooting. The video will be a short news on a topic of students' choice using the deferential speech style. A specific guideline for this project will be distributed in class.

D. Midterm/Final Exam

Midterm and Final exams will test students' understanding of the lecture materials. There are no make-ups or extensions for the exams unless it is a legitimate absence pre-approved by the instructor under the university policy. For all cases, a proper official document is required. Students who miss midterm or final exams without preapproval from the instructor will automatically receive zero for the exam. A specific guideline for the midterm and final examination will be distributed in class a week before the exams.

E. Oral Exams

There will be two oral exams during the midterm and final exam week. Students will be asked to answer the questions by the instructor while utilizing the language vocabulary, expressions, and grammar. Students must receive 70 percent or higher grades to pass the oral exam. If students receive a non-pass, they will be given one more opportunity to retry for the oral exam. A specific guideline for the oral exam will be distributed in class a week before the exam.

CLASS REQUIREMENTS AND POLICIES

- 1) Students are expected to come to class fully prepared for class activities. This means that students should read the textbooks, and preview the vocabulary, grammar and expressions before coming to class.
- 2) There are no make-up quizzes or examinations. Students should be responsible to be on time to take the quizzes and exams.
- 3) The use of mobile devices including cell phones and other electronic devices in class is prohibited unless there is special instruction by the instructor. All mobile devices should be turned off in class. The use of a cell phone during exams or quizzes for any purpose is considered a violation of the Honor Code. This means that students will get an F for the course and will be subject to additional Honor Code sanctions.
