Course Description: We will cover many of the basic descriptive and inferential statistics that are used in the field of psychology. This is a 4-credit course, which includes both a lecture section and a lab section. During lab sessions, we will review and practice topics from the lecture. You will get some hands-on experience using a computer program to analyze data.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Identify and apply appropriate statistical procedures for simple research designs.
- Analyze data using statistical software (e.g., jamovi).
- Communicate statistical findings using APA guidelines.

Lab Overview: The lab portion of this course accounts for 25% toward your final grade. This lab course will consist of 10 assignments, with each assignment being worth 20 points. Each lab will begin with a brief overview of the topic for the day, followed by instructions for completing the lab assignment. Lab assignments will only be completed during lab time.

Attendance & Late Assignments:

Lab attendance is required. Material will be presented in lab that is not covered in lecture and you will be responsible for knowing that information. I will be covering material that will help you with the assignments (I encourage you to have your assignments open to follow along or take notes). If you come late, this is the material that you'll be missing. Lab is a time to have me and your other classmates as a resource to complete the assignment, but if you arrive late, I will not present again, the material from the beginning of the class up until the time you've come in late.
