COURSE OVERVIEW

This course is a survey of the development of the world from early civilizations to the present. Major themes include the rise and fall of governments and empires, the evolution of cultures and society, economics, and commerce, and in the end, globalization. We will examine these themes through a variety of venues including video lectures on Blackboard, primary documents, articles, and film. **IMPORTANT: Students should possess college-level reading and writing skills.** If you have a question about this, please see the instructor or your academic advisor.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- Students will demonstrate familiarity with the major chronology of World Civilization.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to narrate and explain long-term changes and continuities in World Civilization.
- Students will develop historical literacies by analyzing primary sources of various kinds (texts, images, music) and using these sources as evidence to support interpretation of historical events.
- Students will communicate effectively—in writing and on discussion board —their understanding and response to patterns, processes, and themes in the history of world civilization.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK

- There is no required textbook for this course. But if you want a world history book for your own information, try Robert W. Strayer, *Ways of the World: A Brief Global History, Fourth Edition* (Bedford/ St. Martin's, 2019), ISBN 978131911317-9 (Combined edition). This book is also available as an E-book.

DISCUSSION BOARD

You will be assessed on your participation in the class discussion. Each week you will be asked to respond to a discussion question provided by the instructor, related to that week's study material. You will ALSO respond or reply to another classmate's post. Each post is worth 3 points, for a total of 6 points. Each post should be at least 4 or 5 substantial sentences for each question or topic and

demonstrate your engagement with the class. Questions and suggestions for discussion will be available on Blackboard each week.

The discussion board grade is not just an average of the number of points in each week's discussion board. The discussion board posts are all together worth 20% of the final semester grade. This is calculated by the Blackboard Grade Center computer.

SLIDE QUIZZES

Twice during the semester, you will be given a set of slides related to the slides we discussed in class. You will choose one slide, explain the image on it and how it relates to our class material. Slide quizzes are worth 25% each. This is an "open-book" quiz, but you must do your own work and write in your own words. You will NOT do additional research outside the class material.

RESPONSE PAPER

You will be asked to type a 1-2 page, single-space review or analysis of an assigned article or book chapter. You will also be asked to relate the article to what we have studied in class. More information and hints will be posted on Blackboard. This is NOT a group project, and you must do your own work. You will NOT do additional research outside the class material. This response paper counts 30% of the semester grade. There is no formal final exam. More information will be available on Blackboard.
