# **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course explores the socio-political context in which crime policy is created. The influence of public opinion, political institutions, interest groups, and the media will be examined to better understand the various factors that affect the development of criminal justice policy. Over the course of the semester, we will explore topics related to crime prevention, policing, and punishment, and will wrestle with questions such as: How and why do criminal justice policy approaches change over time? How do attributions about the causes of crime impact the development of crime policies? What are the sources of public attitudes toward crime and how does public opinion influence criminal justice policymaking? How does media coverage and interest group activity shape the discourse on crime and crime policy? How has crime been used in political campaigns? Several crime policies will be examined in-depth as case studies and will be compared for relevant themes. By the end of this class, students should have developed a deep understanding of the course material and be able to explain how politics, public opinion, and the media interact to influence the development of crime policy at the national, state, and local level.

# **COURSE FORMAT**

This is a hybrid course (50% in-person, 50% asynchronous online) designed for students in the MS in Criminal Justice program. An in-person seminar will be held on Tuesdays and asynchronous online assignments and activities will be completed on Blackboard.

The in-person seminar will be discussion-based and its success will depend on the preparation and active participation of the students and instructor alike. Although some class sessions may include a short lecture, we will spend most of our time discussing the assigned reading and videos and their implications for the topic at hand. Asynchronous assignments will be used to assess student comprehension and engagement with the material. Students will be encouraged to think critically about the course materials and topics, and to apply and synthesize their (new) knowledge.

#### ASSIGNMENTS AND STUDENT EVALUATION

- 1) Participation/Discussion (20% of final grade). Students are expected to attend the Tuesday seminars and actively engage in class discussions and exercises. Students should come to class having closely read and thoughtfully considered the required readings and videos. Participation grades will be based on a) the submission of discussion questions ahead of each seminar, and b) the extent to which students consistently contribute to seminar discussions by critically examining the course material, raising useful questions or comments, applying the course material to other relevant topics, and creating a positive, respectful classroom environment.
- 2) <u>Async Online Activities (26% of final grade)</u>. Students are expected to read or watch all required course material. To demonstrate comprehension of and engagement with the assigned material, students will complete asynchronous online assignments each week (including reflection journals, reading reviews, and discussion boards, among others).
- 3) Crime Policy Case Study Portfolio (54% of final grade). Students will select one crime policy and complete several assignments to fill their case study portfolio. Assignments will examine public opinion, interest group/political activity, media coverage/framing, and expert commentary on that policy. Building on this work, students will imagine themselves as a consultant to a criminal justice professional or policymaker and will make recommendations related to their selected crime policy via a presentation and written executive summary. Detailed information on the format, requirements, and evaluation criteria for the portfolio assignments will be forthcoming.

#### POLICIES ON STUDENT WORK

<u>Turnaround Time for Grading</u>: Grading for an assignment usually does not begin until on or after the due date. In most cases, assignments submitted on time will be graded within 7 days of the due date (go to the "My Grades" section of Blackboard for scores and feedback). Grading and feedback on some assignments may take longer.

<u>Final Course Grades</u>: Final course grades that are within 0.5 points of the next higher grade will automatically be rounded up to the higher grade (for example, a 79.5/C will become an 80/B-). Final course grades that are on the borderline between two grades may be bumped up to the next grade at the sole discretion of the instructor.
