## **COURSE OVERVIEW**

This course is an introductory survey of the development of world history from early civilizations to the present. Major themes include the rise and fall of governments and empires, the evolution of cultures and society, economics and commerce, and in the end, globalization. We will examine these themes through a variety of venues including articles, chapters in books, primary documents, and film and other media posted on Blackboard, and the professor's video lectures. **This is a fully online, asynchronous course and does not meet together at a specific time, but there are weekly modules and required discussion groups every week.** IMPORTANT: Students should possess college-level reading and writing skills. If you have a question about this, please see the instructor or your academic advisor.

#### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- Students will demonstrate familiarity with the major chronology of World Civilization.
- Students will demonstrate the ability to narrate and explain long-term changes and continuities in World Civilization.
- Students will develop historical literacies by analyzing primary sources of various kinds (texts, images, music) and using these sources as evidence to support interpretation of historical events.
- Students will communicate effectively—in writing and on discussion board —their understanding and response to patterns, processes, and themes in the history of world civilization.

# **REQUIRED TEXTBOOKS**

There is no required textbook for this class. All reading assignments will be posted in weekly modules on Blackboard. If you would like a general survey text for your own interest, I recommend Robert W. Strayer and Eric W. Nelson, Ways of the World: A Brief Global History (Value edition) Combined Volume (2018) or Tom Standage, History of the World in Six Glasses (Walker Publishing Company, 2006).

### **GRADING AND CLASS PARTICIPATION**

Final semester grades are based on weekly participation in Discussion Board (20% all together), three 1-2 page response papers (25% each), and a journal about a country of your choice that you have followed all semester (5%). See "Discussion Board," "Response Papers," and "Journal" below.

 DISCUSSION BOARD. You will be assessed on your participation in the class discussion. You should submit one thoughtful comment or question on Discussion Board each week in order to receive full participation credit. Your answer should be at least 3 or 4 substantial sentences and demonstrate your engagement with the class material. You will also submit a reply or response to another student's posting. Questions and suggestions for discussion will be available on Blackboard each week. Each week is worth up to 6 points (but feel free to submit multiple posts in a discussion).

The discussion board grade is not just an average of the number of points in each week's discussion board. The discussion board posts are all together worth 20% of the final semester grade. This is calculated by the Blackboard computer.

- RESPONSE PAPERS. There are no formal exams for this course. Instead, three times during the semester you will be asked to write a 1-2 page (single-space) response paper related to the material we studied in class. You will be given several questions to answer within the response paper. Response papers are worth up to 100 points each. They each count 25% of the semester grade.
- COUNTRY JOURNAL. At the beginning of the semester, you will be asked to choose one country anywhere in the world (not your own home country) that you will follow for the entire semester. You will get instructions on setting up a journal in Blackboard for your personal entries about that country every week. Entries can be a link and your concise comment about a recent article you found, or an encyclopedia entry, or a travel blog, or a photograph, map, or drawing. The idea is to become familiar with one country in the world and follow its history and current events. You will become an "expert" about that country! You will post an entry every week, and they will be reviewed periodically by the professor, but the entire notebook will graded at the end of the semester. This notebook is worth 5% of your final semester grade.
- Understanding your "Grade so far" on Blackboard: After a few weeks, in the Grade Center on Blackboard, you will see a column labeled "Grade so far." This shows your current course grade based on the work you have completed and I have graded so far. This lets you know how you have performed in this course so far. It does NOT say "this will be your final grade if you stop working now." So, use "Grade so far" to know how you have performed so far and to inspire you to keep your work at a high quality for the rest of the semester!
