# INTS 294 Syllabus (Spring 2024)

### Service-Learning Experience

## Section K01

Service-learning courses offer students, faculty, and community partners an opportunity to work together to integrate and apply knowledge to address community needs. Learning goals, action strategies, and assignments developed collaboratively. Students demonstrate progress through critical reflection that illustrates growth in acquiring and comprehending values, skills, and knowledge content. Critical reflection may take the form of papers, presentations, portfolios, journals, and exams. May be repeated for a maximum 15 credits.

As part of the course, students will be required to volunteer between 20 and 115 hours of service depending on their selected credit hours for the semester. Students will engage with the local community utilizing and reflecting upon what they are learning in class, in their service experience, as well as reflecting critically on their service and applying concepts from class to those reflections.

A commitment has been made to this community partner and students are expected to be present, positive, and engaged during their service experience. You will be responsible for filling out your log sheet regularly and your hours will be confirmed by the community partner.

## Description

Mason Service Corps is a unique class that is designed to incorporate your passion and interest in community development, engagement, and service. In this course, we will explore concepts of community engagement, with particular attention to organizing and personal development through self-awareness and self-monitoring. Throughout the course, we will examine various service leaning activities and critically analyze community engagement.

## **Objectives**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Learn about service-learning projects and integrate and apply knowledge to address community needs.
- Contribute to community prosperity by discovering and utilizing one's strengths.
- Enhance self-awareness about how one's actions can have a positive influence on others and the community through critical self-reflection.
- Reflect on their service learning experiences and consider how they can apply the skills and knowledge they have gained to their future careers.
- Build robust resumes and develop strong LinkedIn profiles that effectively showcase their skills, experiences, and career aspirations.

#### Software

### Contact policy

My ground rules for direct messages are as follows:

### Attendance/Participation

### Service Hours

Service is an integral part of the Mason Service Corps Class. It gives students an opportunity to earn course credit for work that they are already doing in the community.

Breakdown of service hours:

1 Credit = 20 service hours

2 Credits= 70 service hours

Your service-learning site should be solidified by September 30th. Failure to meet the service hour requirements will result in automatic failure of the course.

## Final presentation

Integration of the course material with your semester-long community fieldwork culminates in a class presentation. Your class presentation should be approximately 10 minutes long, outlining your service-learning project, its impact on the community, connections to class discussions and your reflections.

## Conduct

### Academic integrity
